## School History

Denver Jewish Day School (formerly HerzI/RMHA) was formed in 1999 when Theodor Herzl Jewish Day School (grades K-6) and Rocky Mountain Hebrew Academy (grades 7I2, established 1979) merged. Denver Jewish Day School is currently the largest Jewish day school in the Rocky Mountain region with close to $\mathbf{3 5 0}$ students in kindergarten through grade I2. The school provides a high quality college preparatory and Judaic education, and $\mathbf{9 8 \%}$ of its graduates have pursued college educations.

## Graduation with Distinction in Judaic Studies

'Honors' designates courses in the Judaic Studies Program that have a greater requirement of academic rigor, and/or a greater challenge of textual skills in Hebrew and Aramaic. A student may earn Graduation with Distinction in Judaic Studies by taking 8 semesters of Honors Judaic Studies courses and earning an average of A- (3.5 GPA) in all of these Judaic Studies courses.

Graduation with Distinction in Tzedek
Graduation with Distinction in Tzedek (justice and service learning) requires four semesters of additional honors coursework, a capstone project detailing a service project completed in the student's junior/senior year, and significant leadership in the field of advocacy and volunteer work.

## Grade Point Average

The GPA is cumulative and calculated from the beginning of the 9 th grade. GPA is based on a 4.0 scale with no additional weight given to Honors or Advanced Placement classes. Class rank is not computed because of small class size. A traditional A-F grading scale is used.

*All seniors participate in this experiential learning program focusing on life lessons, the work world and community service with a kickoff trip to Seattle focusing on leadership.

All high school students are required to complete 18 hours of annual community service. Over 70\% of students participate in team sports (volleyball, soccer, basketball or baseball).

## Academic Course Sequence

Sequences for the Class of $\mathbf{2 0 1 9}$ 's dual curriculum are listed below. Many classes are taught at an advanced level, but this is not indicated on transcript. Students can supplement the graduation requirements with electives. It is possible to study Spanish as an elective for two years. Most classes meet for 210 minutes weekly. The majority of required classes are two semesters. Students are required to enroll in seven academic classes each semester. All science classes are lab based.
